

Acts 2:1-4 says, 'When the day of Pentecost came, they were all together in one place. Suddenly a sound like the blowing of a violent wind came from heaven and filled the whole house where they

were sitting. They saw what seemed to be tongues of fire that separated and came to rest on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues as the Spirit enabled them.' We have embarked on what ends up being the longest period of time in the church year. I embrace what lies ahead during this Pentecost journey.

If you find an opportunity that presents itself to you, take advantage of it, have conversation and be open to how God is working. I can not wait to hear about how your Pentecost journey is going, and about the exciting travels you have undertaken this summer!

This summer will still be pretty busy at church too. After worship each Sunday, a Post-worship prayer time will take place in the sanctuary. We will lift up the folks on the Prayer Concerns sheet as we light a candle for each of them. Have some refreshments, and then come and join us for this time of lifting up our brothers and sisters.

Breakfast at Sally's

I just finished reading a great book all about one man's journey through homelessness. The man was Richard LeMieux. He had been a highly successful publisher, buying his wife expensive jewelry, living in an upscale home, taking \$40,000 vacations, driving high-end cars. But Richard's life changed.

He lost his clients to Internet-based publishers; couldn't pay his bills; his wife left him; his friends eventually closed their doors to him; he was evicted from his beautiful home – leaving him with a van, a small dog, and barely enough money to fill the gas tank. Richard joined the ranks of the homeless ... and things went downhill from there.

Today, this story isn't so rare. Our robust economy, which many thought would last a lifetime, has crumbled around many of our neighbors. I'm not here to argue which of them got a bad deal and which of them made irresponsible life decisions — they're still homeless.

I want to talk to you about "Sally's" (the Salvation Army), or more precisely, the role we play in the survival of the poor and homeless.

Richard's story, a true one, centers on the church. For over a year, that church was the Salvation Army, a place where Richard could get three meals a day for free. Again the church played a major role when one adopted Richard, gave him a place to sleep (out of the cold) and eventually co-signed a lease on an apartment for him. It is pretty clear that without the church, Richard would not have survived.

Here are some things I learned from Richard's book:

- The homeless have been rejected by just about everyone (spouses, family, and friends there is no place left to go.)
- Homeless are viewed as dangerous, crazy, sick, dirty and untrustworthy (but most don't fit that description at all.)

- It is nearly impossible for someone who is homeless to gain decent employment (chaining them to a lifetime of homelessness and poverty.)
- Eventually, the homeless lose their ability to secure identification documents these are nearly impossible to get without a valid home phone number and physical address.
- Only a few organizations do enough to make a difference in the lives of the homeless.

So, what do we do Jack?

We've already taken the first steps, and have been for a number of years:

... Thanksgiving and Christmas meals for those in need feed some folks for a few days at least; but, what of the other 360 days of the year? Could we do better?

... Our pantry offerings have gotten pretty sparse in the last 6 months or so. Our pantry is small – a few families with need can empty it in minutes. What if each family brought one non-perishable item each week for worship?

... Pastor needs the use of a Discretionary Fund. These are monies at his disposal to help people who approach him for assistance (a meal, gas for the car, a room for the night, medicine...) Mark your check "Pastor's Fund."

... Do we have the resources to do a weekly meal? These meals are the kinds of things that spell survival for those on the street. Are we ready to get our hands dirty?

Richard LeMieux' book, called *Breakfast at Sally's*, is a true eye-opener. It'll make you cry, and it'll make you laugh. It is a book about faith by a man who lost his belief in God, but found it in his heart to pray for those worse off than himself. I highly recommend it! Pick it up at the Moreno Valley Library.

Now is not the time to reduce our benevolence. The Good Steward, in these times, will find blessing in increased charity.

Amen?

If you have ever had a desire to work on a project with Habitat for Humanity, a wonderful opportunity awaits you. Thrivent Builds and Habitat for Humanity, along with the Western Riverside County Chapter of Thrivent, have teamed up to build a home for a young, local family in Rubidoux and they are looking for volunteers. The actual groundbreaking occurred on March 28, 2009 but due to delays with the final permits, the construction is just beginning. The work crews had a very successful day on June 20 and were able to raise the first wall in the new house, but much more work lies ahead. The group is in need of volunteers, with or without skills. The majority of the work days occur on Saturdays and anyone 16 years of age and older is encouraged to participate in this project. If you are not able to participate, donations are also welcome to help offset some of the cost of supplies. Thrivent Builds is responsible for raising a percentage of the total funds needed to complete the home and their goal has not yet been met.
